**The Recommendations of the International
Conference on Common Human Ethics and Its Role in Building a
World Governed by Justice, Peace, and Compassion**

**London Declaration on the Common Human Ethical Denominator
London - 12 September 2026**

Drawing on the scholarly and intellectual discussions during the proceedings of the International Conference "The Common Human Ethic and Its Role in Building a World Governed by Justice, Peace, and Compassion," organised by the International Centre for International Centre of Human Values & Cultural Cooperation (ICVCC) - London;

Grounded in the belief that universal human values—namely dignity, justice, freedom, and solidarity—transcend cultural and civilizational divides to unite humanity against violence and injustice.

Grounded in the conviction that international stability demands an ethical framework alongside strategic interests, state power must be bound by responsibility and sovereignty by respect for human dignity. The Conference hereby submits these recommendations:

- 1.** A call to develop a scholarly and conceptual framework for the Common Human Ethics, grounded in the values around which the various cultures, religions, and philosophies converge, while respecting cultural particularities.
- 2.** Reaffirming that human dignity grounds our shared ethical standards, while the protection of individuals and their fundamental rights being an indispensable priority of national and international policies.
- 3.** Creating an international network of researchers, thinkers, and institutions focused on the Common Human Ethic will facilitate knowledge sharing and foster collaborative, cross-border research.
- 4.** Lasting global stability depends on restoring justice and applying international law and humanitarian principles equally to all nations without double standards—making the protection of civilians and vulnerable populations a top priority in every conflict; with an immediate end to the destruction in Gaza and other aggressions wars in Sudan, Lebanon, and Iran, and a swift delivery of adequate humanitarian relief, and accountability for perpetrators to combat impunity and restore faith in international justice.





5. Urging sovereign states and political entities to exhaust diplomacy, mediation, and preventative strategies prior to resorting to force, and calling for the realignment of international partnerships around the principles of justice, equity, and moral responsibility.
6. Affirming that enduring peace extends beyond the mere cessation of hostilities, peacebuilding demands addressing structural conflict drivers and upholding justice, human dignity, liberty, and societal reconciliation
7. Calling upon digital institutions and media outlets to cultivate constructive public discourse that combats incitement and discrimination, while establishing robust legal standards to safeguard these efforts.
8. Providing dedicated support to civil society organizations advances their capacity to cultivate value-based awareness and civic engagement on the ground.
9. Urging the operationalization of human compassion, transforming it from a moral commitment into actionable policy and institutional frameworks to serve populations affected by armed conflict and humanitarian emergencies.
10. Enhancing international cooperation requires institutionalizing solidarity and collective accountability as the operational foundation for addressing displacement, systemic poverty, and severe humanitarian emergencies.
11. Urging the institutionalisation and adoption of these recommendations as the 'London Declaration on Common Human Ethics,' a reference text for international institutions to build upon through continued dialogue.
12. Encouraging governments, donor institutions, universities, and research centres to allocate grants to support studies and applied projects related to shared human values, conflict prevention, and international dialogue.
13. Encouraging the building of partnerships among international civil society organizations in order to strengthen the standing of shared values and consolidate their foundations.

Confronting profound global transformations, Conference participants call for a renewed ethical foundation in international governance, urging a shift from the mere articulation of human values to their structural implementation in global policy and institutional practice.

Participants call for establishing Common Human Ethics as a bridge across civilizations, a cornerstone for renewing faith in multilateralism, and a gateway toward a more equitable and harmonious international order.
